President's Message: Bob Snider

I have bookmarked on my internet browser several sites that provide reports on the water levels on Georgian Bay. My goto site is generally the US Corp of Engineers Daily Water levels page (Google those words if you have not been to the site before). This time of year when I am not at the cottage I find myself staring at the graph trying to visualize what 10 inches of water over last year's level will do to my dock, ramp and shore structure. I am somewhat relieved though that the forecast for July 2018 is water levels no higher than this past summer.

While the water level forecast for July 2018 is still 12 to 14 inches below the HWM, it will again create challenges at the beach that the CCA Rec Program operates from on Arthur Island. As the water level has risen over the past few years the beach available for boat landing, the program's activities, and as an area to just sit and watch has shrunk to almost nothing. While last year's program struggled with the inadequate area of beach, plans are afoot this year to make improvements behind the beach area to allow the program to continue to operate at this location.

Municipal elections will take place in November 2018. Changes to the Municipal Elections Act have changed the nomination deadlines and rules for who needs to register as a lobby group with the Township. By-law changes by the Township eliminated the mail-in ballots in favour of internet and phone-in voting. The Township's Clerk has also taken

I think I speak for most of us when I say that this winter can't end soon enough!!! I'm sure we are all dreaming of sunny days, warm nights, relaxing swims and beautiful sunsets!

We are well into the process of planning for summer 2018! We would like to welcome back Molly Giroux as head of the Recreation program and we are in the throws of hiring the rest of the Recreation staff.

The 2018 CCA recreation program will run from July 2nd to August 23rd with the senior canoe trip tentatively scheduled for August 15th-16th and the junior canoe trip tentatively scheduled for July 25-26th. We will continue to have swimming lessons on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays in the mornings. Camp Cognashene will happen on Tuesdays for kids entering grade 1 to grade 7, water sports for ages 6 and up will take place Wednesday afternoons. Kognashene Kinders will be held on Thursday mornings for ages 2 through senior kindergarten, and YPOC will run Monday afternoons for our older campers.

Registration will begin the end of April - beginning of May and the early bird discount will be in effect until <u>May 31st</u>. Active Enjoyment of the Bay: Sandy Thompson

With the never ending snow and cold in Ontario this winter, it is hard to think about black flies, mosquitoes and warm summer nights. But, a quick flip through photos from last summer on our phones, and we can easily imagine that in only a few months we will be loading the boat again and heading out on the Bay. For most of us, the opening of the cottage and those first few weekends are filled with cleaning, inspecting and possibly fixing things that might have been damaged over the winter. Hopefully, it also includes seeing new and old friends and neighbours, and catching up on the dock. As you start to put together your actual, or mental, to-do list for the spring and summer, consider adding a new action or two to support the environment and the Bay.


As stewards and lovers of Georgian Bay, we have learned a lot over the past decades, and we know that dumping (or spilling) fuels and chemicals in the lake is not ok. The solution to pollution is NOT dilution. We are diligent about cleaning off our boats when we move between regions so as not to spread invasive species (Zebra Mussels highlighted this for us!). We do not bathe or wash in the lake (biodegradable soaps still affect the water chemistry and can affect aquatic species). The list of things that we now know to be environmentally harmful at the cottage go on and on.

So what else can we do, pro-actively? Some of these things you have heard from me before, however I thought I would highlight a few of the more important ones for you here:

Water Sampling:

Last winter in the newsletter I wrote an article about joining the Lake Partner Program (LLP) run by the Ontario Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change which is a volunteer sampling program that monitors total phosphorus and

water clarity. <u>http://</u> <u>www.desc.ca/programs/lpp)</u> It involves taking a water sample at the beginning and end of the season and taking water clarity measurements (with a supplied secchi disk) at least every two weeks. As you can see from the map on the LPP website, there are lots of spots available that we can help out with (N.B. I am not sure all of last year's locations have been updated.)

Report Animal Sightings:

Helping to track the natural species, especially those that are threatened, in our area is helpful for scientists monitoring changes in Ontario and the Bay. Last year, I highlighted the Toronto Zoo Adopta-Pond program for reporting sightings of Turtles and Frogs in Ontario. Even better, this year is the **Adopt-a-Pond App** so you can record your sightings immediately. It also includes identification guides. You can find it at the IOS App Store or Android Google Play Store (it's free). If you prefer birding, you can input your sightings into the **eBird Canada website** (http://ebird.ca/sightings.jsp).

Manage your Shoreline:

And you thought you'd get through an article without me mentioning Phragmites! I won't say much other than to say "keep up the great work!" If you are new to Cognashene, and don't know about 'Phrag" yet, please reach out to me or one of your neighbours to learn about the programs we have available to identify and manage the invasive reed. We are winning with our efforts! Good management of our shorelines means encouraging the growth of natural grass and reed species and careful removal of invasive species. Try to resist the urge to pull out or cut all the grasses to create a beach. The grasses and reeds are nesting grounds for many aquatic species as well as providing natural protection for young fish and aquatic species. All of these areas, along with our wetlands, are the nurseries that keep our waters healthy. They also help buffer the effects of changing water levels and shoreline erosion...water is expected to be higher than the long term average again this year!

Plastics and Microplastics:

Microbeads will be banned in toiletries in Canada starting July 1, 2018, and are being voluntarily removed by manufacturers before this. If you still have any scrubs or exfoliating body washes with microbeads in them, the best way to dispose of them is in the garbage. There is also an ongoing and growing problem with microplastics in all lakes and oceans. These are from filaments like fishing lines, and plastics such as bags and bottes, that get broken up in the water, but do not decompose or disappear – they only get small enough so they are hard to see. You can help reduce microplastics by keeping plastic out of the water through cleaning up your shoreline of all (even tiny) plastic pieces in the spring, picking up any floating plastics you see during the summer, and limiting your use of plastics at the cottage (do you really need a straw?)

Adding one or two of these actions to your spring/summer to-do list will hopefully engage your family and friends in appreciating the beauty and complex ecosystem of Georgian Bay, and will go a long way to supporting the health of the Bay for years to come.

Municipal Council Report: Steven Jarvis

There were two Municipal Conflict of Interest actions heard by the Ontario Superior Court of Justice on Jan 5, 2018 and a decision was made by Jan 22. The first, initiated by Catherine Cooper, Louise Rivett and Lorne Cameron cited Councilors Cynthia Douglas, Paul Wianko and Kathy Kay to be in conflict of interest regarding SEGBAY (Southeast Georgian Bay Chamber of Commerce). The application was dismissed with the judge stating that it was unlikely that there was any benefit from the relevant Council decisions to Councilors Wianko and Kay and, in the case of Councilor Douglas, any conflict was due more to ignorance than intent.

The second action was initiated by Louise Rivett citing Mayor Larry Braid, Councilors Paul Wianko, Kathy Kay and Brian Bochek to be in conflict of interest regarding a specific vote at Council on whether an audit of the lease agreement between the Municipality and SEGBAY for use of Municipal space should go ahead or not. This action was also dismissed by the judge.

It would require a full reading of the two decisions to fully understand the how's and why's of what transpired at the hearing. Both are available on the Ontariocourts.ca website or contact me at (<u>municipalaffairs@cognashene.com</u>) if you wish a copy. If you have any interest in how our court system works particularly with regards to this type of action, the decisions are interesting reading.

Since these decisions, there have been a number of votes at Council where Councilors recused themselves due to possible perception of a conflict of interest – an interesting development.
