A wide variety of users frequent Georgian Bay and they include: kayakers, anglers, hunters, cruising boaters, day sailors, canoeists, contractors/tradespersons, guests, tenants as well as permanent and seasonal residents.

Georgian Bay for Everyone is intended to be a resource and a guide for shared enjoyment of the Bay. It replaces the Georgian Bay Boater and Cottager Code, originally printed Spring 2002 and updated 2005. It is our hopes that this pamphlet will reach a broader audience so please share it with other users of the Bay.

This pamphlet has been developed cooperatively by the GBA, cottage associations, and representatives from the marine industry, boaters and input from the OPP. Both Boating Ontario and the Georgian Bay Association have contributed financially to printing costs."

#### Port Severn to celebrate 100th Anniversary of Lock 45

On a sunny Saturday morning in July 1915, a flotilla of boats belonging to members of the Midland Businessmen's Association gathered at the newly constructed lock at Port Severn. Large crowds lined the shores to witness an historic event.

Just a decade or so earlier, Port Severn faced an uncertain future. The Georgian Bay Lumber Company Mill, which had operated in Port Severn for over 50 years and had been the major employer running through over 20 million board feet of lumber per year, was struck by lightning and burned to the ground leaving Port Severn without its only employer.

As fate and luck would have it, another reason for Port Severn's existence was about to occur and, very likely, saved Port Severn from disappearing off the map. The Trent Severn Waterway, begun in 1833, was slowly expanding westward toward Georgian Bay and Port Severn was chosen to be the entrance into the Bay. The lumber companies' aging timber and mud dams built so many years before were replaced with a modern concrete dam and a small lock to allow access between Gloucester Pool and Georgian Bay. While only meant to be temporary until a larger lock was constructed, the original lock still stands today and is the last completely hand operated lock on the waterway.



On that warm July day in 1915, as the Pipes were sounding, the little flotilla was locked through into Gloucester Pool, the first leg of the Trent Severn Waterway and into one of Canada's most unique and beautiful National Parks.

Almost 100 years to the day on Saturday July 25th 2015, witness a re-enactment of the first lockage through Lock 45, where vintage boats will recreate this historic event. Then enjoy a day of picnics and a street fair that will be held throughout the village.

Come and join The Georgian Bay Township Historical Society, Georgian Bay, Severn and Tay Townships and the Southeast Georgian Bay Chamber of Commerce (SEGBAY) for the 100th Anniversary of Lock 45, Port Severn on the Trent Severn Waterway.



**Friday evening, July 24th...**Gala Dinner followed by an on water fireworks display.

**Saturday all day, July 25th...** Historic re-enactment of first lockage through Lock 45, Street Fair throughout Port Severn and fun, family entertainment.

## Personal and household cleaning products

Last summer I was asked what brand of shampoo I recommended for use at the cottage and I did not have a specific answer at the time (I still don't have a specific answer). The cleaning products that we use at the cottage have a direct effect on the quality of our water and the health of the ecosystems on the islands. We know that we should not use any cleaning products directly in the lake as the water does not have free oxygen needed for materials to biodegrade. But what about the products that go down the drain and into our septic systems?

Septic systems are designed to trap the solids and allow for them to break down with the help of bacteria in the tanks with the liquid (effluent) flowing into the surrounding soil. What happens to the chemicals in the shampoo and soaps we use? These materials are dissolved/suspended in the water and while some may remain in in the tank, the majority of chemicals flow with the effluent into the drainage bed where they enter the natural environment. Therefore, what we put into the septic system, the location of our septic system, and its condition, will have a direct effect on the health of the natural environment around the cottage and, eventually, the lake. Choosing biodegradable products that will breakdown into carbon, oxygen and water in the soil can reduce the build up of other chemicals and toxins in the soils.

"Regular" shampoos, dish detergents, and body washes generally contain and materials that are not biodegradable in

addition to sodium laureth sulfate (SLES) which helps to make them bubble and foam. The manufacturing of SLES includes materials that are known and probable human carcinogens and can remain in the SLES and in the products and can accumulate in the soils. When choosing a cleaning product, soap or shampoo, look for those without SLES (some 'green' products still contain SLES) and a product that is biodegradable.

Cleaning products used on the deck or outdoors should be non-toxic and biodegradable and used only in areas where the wash water has at least 100 feet of soil to run through before it will get to the water (100 feet of open rock doesn't count.) This will allow the cleaning materials to be broken down in the soils and not run directly to the water.

Update: We published an article last year about microbeads: small plastic pieces that are used as exfoliants in body wash and face scrubs and in toothpaste (beatthemicrobead.org). In March 2015, a

#### What can you do?

- 1. Remember: if you won't drink it, don't put it in the lake.
- 2. Ensure your septic is working properly and that no sewage water is running directly to the lake.
- 3. Think about what goes down the drain. Use biodegradable products that can be broken down in the drainage bed and vegetation of the island.
- 4. Use products without SLES and other additives.
- 5. Check your products for microbeads and throw those products in the garbage to ensure the plastic microbeads do not make their way into the lake systems.

private members bill was introduced at Queens Park to ban the manufacture and addition of microbeads to products in Ontario. 
